Student Story

I came to Northwest because God called me here. I didn't give it a second thought and said "the plan is just." It was up until the first day of school that I was relaxed, I felt like there was nothing to fear. The first week of school felt like a smack to the face. It was then that I realized what I felt was my greatest fear: Memory loss. For as long as I can remember I have been dealing with memory loss. I don't tell a lot of people because most don't believe me. I told all of my professors, I also told them I didn't fully understand what my memory loss was going to mean as far as my classes were concerned. Every time I would have to tell a professor or a fellow student I would say to myself "the plan is just."

I started to feel more confident in school again... until exams and tests came. I would feel confident, continually telling myself "the plan is just". But once the papers got in front of me, I couldn't remember a thing. I would still try to remind myself "the plan is just" but it became nothing but words.

As the semester continued I felt like things kept being thrown at me. Having nightmares every night didn't help. I wrote in my journal for God to help me, but that's when the lies began. Satan kept telling me that I was worthless, that coming to Northwest was the biggest mistake I ever made. And for some reason I began to agree with him. I saw the hurts in others and began to think that the world is full of nothing but pain and suffering. However "in paradise all is forgiven, you'll be at peace." I remembered. So went the road that I thought was the best. However it was only a road of more pain. I separated myself from almost everyone I could, but that just made me feel worse. I started to feel like nothing was worth it and I would rather die. I only told one of my friend's that. (He's known me since I was 12). I know it pained him for me to tell him that, but I needed to tell someone other than God. I refused to be comforted. I only wanted to be in Heaven, I wanted to be with my family and friends there. I also knew that Satan couldn't get to me there. It was the 11th and 12th of March that it got worse. I couldn't handle it anymore. I knew I could never kill myself, but I begged God every day just to let me die. Just to take me away from the earth and escape the pain.

On the 12th I went to Pursuit like I usually do. As usual I put up my mask, pretending that everything was OK and nothing was wrong, while on the inside I was crying. As I started to listen to the music I started to become quiet. I heard a quiet "I love you" and I fell to my knees and started to cry. I knew it was God talking to me. He reminded me that it wasn't just by chance that I came to Northwest, He told me to go, it was His plan for me. He reminded me that there is nothing I could do to make Him stop loving me, and He is with me always. It was then that I was reminded of the phrase "the plan is just" and it meant so much more. I praise God that He didn't let my life end just because I wanted it to. I am thankful that He placed me at Northwest because I am surrounded by wonderful people and the most amazing friends I could ever ask for.
