This is the first concert of the new year. The spring vocal recital is Thursday, April 22 at 7 PM in M-1. The spring instrumental recital is Thursday, April 22 at 7 PM in the chapel. Both recitals are free and open to the public. The spring wind and choir concert is Friday, April 16 at 7 PM in the chapel.

The Northwest Music Department offers four degree programs (B.A. or B.F.A.)-music, music education, music industry, and music ministry. Students may also minor in music. The department has four full-time professors, twelve adjunct professors, and fifty-eight music majors. The music education program is certified through the State of Washington.

Performance groups include the Concert Choir, Jazz Band, Northwest Choralons, Vocal Jazz, and Wind Ensemble. Auditions are held the first week of the semester and membership in the groups is open to all students, regardless of major. All groups perform in at least one major concert per semester and perform in other venues throughout the year.

The mission of Northwest College is to provide, in a distinctly evangelical Christian environment, a quality education that will prepare students for service and leadership.
