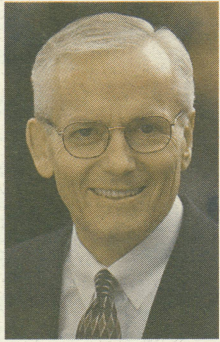

Energy for the new Millennium

We are tired and need a break and we wonder if Jesus ever felt like this? He too had family misunderstandings, people clamoring for his attention. He carried a heavy load of responsibility. He had to deal with ego struggles among his followers. He too endured the criticism of his enemies. He spent long nights alone. Do you ever wonder if He ever felt like He wanted to run, hop on a chariot and get out of town?

Jesus taught us how to face these struggles in the following ways:

1. He leaned heavily on human companionship. He was not a loner. He realized that He needed fellowship. The first thing He did when he entered public ministry was to select some men to fellowship with and to join Him in his work. He taught us that we really do need each other. We should not try and make it all alone.
2. He saturated himself with the Word.
3. He remembered the end of the story.
4. He took time to pray and commune with the Father.

What can we learn from what Jesus did?

1. We too must reach out to our fellow ministers for fellowship. We will not be loners.
2. We must spend more time in the Word.
3. We will remember the end of the story. The joys of Easter would not be possible without the sorrows of Good Friday.
4. We will keep the daily discipline of prayer.

Remember, life does what it has to do and then we move on.

Whatever may have happened to us in 1999, the new year is God's way of saying: "New beginnings are possible... Move on."

Have faith in the future... if there is no faith in the future, there is no power in the present.

Remember to forget

Philippines 3:13,14. Genesis 41:51 "God hath made me forget all my trouble..."

- We regard a good memory as a great thing... a unique and wonderful gift. To recall a name, a face, etc. is a great attribute to be developed and envied.

Power to forget is equally as great an attribute. Many of us already have that gift. We forget our wives birthday's, anniversaries, etc. Most of us forget a lot of things if we don't write them down.

Illustration: There was a man who went to a Psychiatrist to complain about his bad memory. The Dr. asked, "How long have you had this problem?" Answer... "What problem?"

- One of the most feared and sad diseases that afflicts older people is Alzheimer's. An attack on our memory.
- There is no question that such kinds of forgetfulness cause serious problems and they should not be taken lightly.

A bad memory causes a lot of problems, but a bad forgetter can be equally as damaging.

The importance of forgetting... the passage of time and the erasing of memories is a great natural consequence of life.

- When Joseph became a man of substance in Egypt a son was born to him. He named him Manasseh... which means... "God has made me to forget." Flung into a pit, sold by his brothers, slandered by a woman, thrown into prison... Now it was all behind him. The bitterness had left his spirit as he explained... "God has made me to forget."

Someone once said: "The conscious memory has a preference for the pleasant"

Things we should forget:

- The hurtful things that were said about you last year.
- The sins that God has forgiven.
- The dumb things you have said.

Things you should remember.

- Remember who you are...
- Remember where you are going...
- Remember who is going with you...

We often sing a line from an old and familiar hymn, "Because He lives I can face tomorrow." But how often we forget this important reminder of truth. Because He lives... He has already faced everything you and I will ever face. Because He lives... You and I will never face any difficulty, trial, or burden alone. And because He lives... you and I can forgive and forget.

In this new year of ministry may we remember truth rather than injury. As Romans 8:28 reminds us, "...that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose."

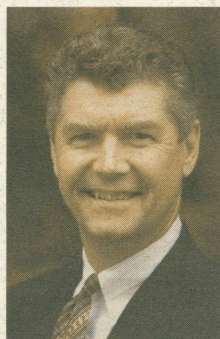

His responsibilities included: training caregivers, facilitating support groups and speaking out concerning the church's responsibility to respond with love and compassion to HIV/AIDS related issues, as well as other issues affecting the hurting within our communities. As a result of Rob's experiences, his story was published by Focus On The Family, in the 1995 edition of the Promise Keepers "Power of a Promise Kept." He has been a featured speaker on College and University campuses, made guest appearances on radio and television shows, and has been featured in CHARISMA Magazine, The Pentecostal Evangel and various newspapers.

Rob and his wife Teresa have been married 29 years, have two daughters Holly and Jennifer and are enjoying the thrill of being grandparents.

Less is More

David Baker, our new Dean of the Chapel, recently shared exciting statistics that reported on last semester's chapel services.

You may know that after an extensive study of our chapel programming, we made changes to the chapel format including: longer chapel services, three daytime chapels, extended "altar" time, and fewer excused absences.

The stats reveal that, in this case, **less is more!** Even though there are fewer chapel services, **attendance actually increased.** Student-contact hours in our fall semester **increased nearly 50%.** We can attribute this to longer chapels, fewer skips, higher quality programming, and a noticeable increase of fervency in our student body.

Nursing Keeps Accelerating

We are thrilled to report the following recent victories in the development of the Mark and Huldah Buntain School of Nursing.

October 1999 - Mission of Mercy awarded a grant of \$100,000 to underwrite start-up costs. "Mission of Mercy is helping to meet the physical and spiritual needs of hurting people in poverty-stricken areas of the world," explains Bob Houlihan, President of Mission of Mercy. "Our partnership with Northwest College is more than funding. We have supported the vision from the beginning and eagerly anticipate the next steps."

November 1999 - The Board of Directors named Dr. Carl Christensen as the Dean of the School of Nursing. Dr. Christensen brings professional and academic credentials including: Fulbright Scholar, Ph.D. from George Washington University, and registered nurse. Dr. Christensen said, "I feel that God has uniquely prepared me for leadership of the Buntain School."

December 1999 - The State of Washington gave approval for Northwest College to award a four-year Bachelor of Science Degree in Nursing.

December 1999 - A businessman and his wife from California gave \$100,000 to help start the School of Nursing.

January 2000 - Northwest College announced the official dedication of the School of Nursing. Huldah Buntain will be in attendance at ceremonies on September 29, 2000.
